

Task 1: Design Insights from Two Films

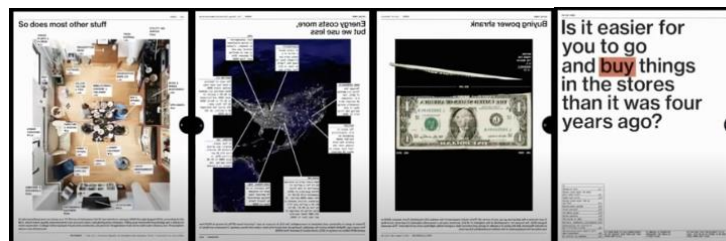

Part 1: Insights from Tracy Ma's Talk

1. Coherent Themes

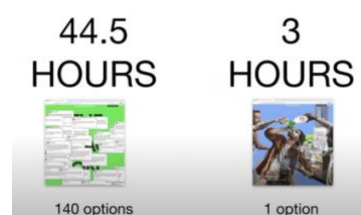
Tracy highlighted the importance of a central theme in design, as seen in *BusinessWeek's* election issue. This showed me that good design goes beyond visuals, it ensures every element reinforces the main message. I aim to prioritize thematic cohesion in my work to deliver clearer and more impactful communication.

2. Balancing Speed and Depth

Tracy compared quick illustrations to long-term projects that require months of effort. This taught me to adjust my approach depending on the project. I learned to work efficiently on smaller tasks while dedicating time and attention to more complex designs.

4. Technology as a Tool

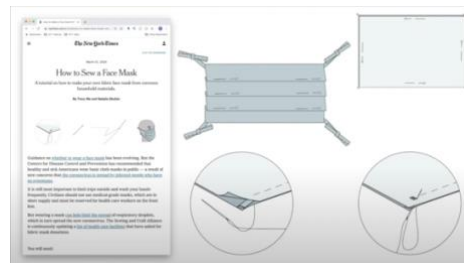

Part 2: Insights from Avatar Robot Café

1. Design Can Empower Marginalized Groups

The café's use of remote-control technology to empower individuals with mobility impairments showed me how design can break barriers and promote inclusion. I want to focus on creating accessible, user-friendly solutions for marginalized groups, ensuring design empowers and improves lives.

2. Technology Can Foster Human-Animal Connections

While the video focuses on people with disabilities, it also made me think about how similar technology could create opportunities for stray animals. For instance, remote interaction devices could allow people to “virtually adopt” animals, building emotional connections while raising awareness about stray animal issues. Such a design could satisfy emotional needs and potentially lead to real-life rescue actions.

In the future, I aim to use design to raise awareness of social issues and inspire positive change through creative solutions.

Disarmingly futuristic, The Robot Café offers a literal out of body experience to the severely disabled. Harnessing human, not artificial, intelligence and unlocking potential for those with limited mobility. It made me uncomfortable, it made me think, it challenged my preconceptions and it made me feel. The stuff of science fiction becoming science fact and inspiring hope for a fulfilling life beyond the boundaries of the human body.
